SPEAKERS' BIOGRAPHIES

He has 20 years of professional experience in the high-tech sector as a product development engineer in areas ranging from cardiac pacemakers and undersea robotic vehicles to greenhouse control systems. Dan spent 7 years in Japan as a student and engineer conducting product development and technology transfer. He is fluent in Japanese.
